Safe Sidewalks Project

On June 11, 2022, nine Hawaii Kai Lions and one CIS met at Hahaione Elementary School to repair the sidewalk cracks on Pepeekeo Street surrounding the school. This project was a reschedule from April 16, 2022, which was cancelled due to rain. Scott Goto, from the City's Division of Road Maintenance's Malama O Ka Aina (MOKA) community volunteer program, was present and demonstrated how to mix and apply the concrete-like material to the cracks. Thereafter, the Lions split up into two groups, working on opposite sides of Pepeekeo Street until 10:15 a.m. A total of 20 sites/sidewalk cracks were patched.

Lions participating in this event included Cynthia Chun, Ellsworth Fujii, Yolisa Ishibashi and CIS Anthony Nakamura, Walter Kuroiwa, Marja Leivo, Frances Lum, Ken Nishibun, Appan Subramanian, and Allen Umeda.

This project was mentioned on the KHON2 6:00 p.m. news that night, which included pictures of the Lions and CIS hard at work. This story is also posted online (https://www.khon2.com/local-news/hawaii-kai-lions-club-patches-up-pothole-ridden-street/), and on KHON's Face-book and Twitter accounts.

Since there were still areas needing to be patched on this street, a future date for repairs will be scheduled with the City. Thereafter, other streets in Hawaii Kai may be scheduled for later in the year or next year. Mahalo to those Lions who showed up to mix the concrete-like material (had to be the right consistency) and literally got down on their hands and knees to patch the cracks. Great job everyone!

State Hearing and Vision Screening

On June 15, 2022 Governor David Ige signed House Bill 987, HD 1 SD1 into law. This new law amends an existing statute (section 321-101, Hawaii Revised Statutes) to increase the early identification of children with hearing or vision loss, by establishing consistent protocols for hearing and vision screening and follow-up, screener training, and data collection.

The Department of Health, which initiated the bill, Children with Special Needs Branch, Department of Education partners, as well as a host of community organizations involved with hearing and vision screening helped shepherd the bill through the past two legislative sessions.

On behalf of District 50 Lions, Lion Dr. Shannon Ching and Lion Dr. Roger Ede were present at the State Capitol to witness the signing of the bill. This measure is welcomed by health care professionals and lay volunteer organizations who advocate for the early identification and detection of hearing and vision disorders in children. Members of our state legislature agreed that early identification of hearing and vision loss, with appropriate follow-up services, is critical for the development of children's language, communication and life skills needed for learning in school.

The new law directs the Department of Health to set recommended standards for:

- 1. Protocols for evidence-based hearing and vision screening, including ages or grades for screening;
- 2. Screening tools, instruments, passing and referral criteria based on national guidelines and best practices;
- 3. Referrals, track referrals and follow-up of children who do not pass screening;
- 4. Training, certification and qualifications of personnel who conduct hearing and vision screenings other than licensed health care professionals; and
- 5. Data and reporting on hearing and vision screening, referrals and follow-up.

Also, "within available resources, the program shall include consultation with and education of students, parents, and health and education personnel about hearing and vision screening, treatment, and services."

The Department of Health is now in the process of gathering those current best practices and nationwide models to implement screening standards for the State of Hawaii.

District 50 Lions have participated for many years in Hearing and Vision Screening and our Hawaii Kai Lions has helped to lead the way in this effort. "Proud to be a Lion, Dedicated to the Service of others."
