- Lion Wendell Hosea (Mana Loa-Nimitz): I joined the Lions at 29 years old to enjoy long time friendships. I have been energized by the experiences.
- PDG Chris Tamura (Pearl City): I joined the Pearl City Lions Club when I was 28 years old. I was working for a national CPA Firm and one of the career objectives was to join a civic organization. At that time, the Pearl City Club put on a large community carnival with EK Fernandez rides and many community food booths. There are also courses on Club President, Secretary, and Treasurer.
- 2. https://lionsuniversity.org Earn Bachelors, Masters and Doctorate degrees each requiring completion of 10 required courses, at least 5 elective classes and specific leadership experiences. After each course a simple on-line test confirms learning.

Spotlight on Lion Chris J. Kalopodes



First Vice District Governor Chris J. (C.J.) Kalopodes was born on January 28, 1944, in Honolulu to Parents Helen (Okinawan) and Chris J. (Greek, Irish) at Tripler Hospital

("free baby"). He lived in Damon Track (the area between Nimitz Highway and the old Honolulu International Airport terminal on Lagoon Drive) until he was 10 years old and moved to Kaneohe where he attended Benjamin Parker School and Castle High School (1962).

He has worked in the construction industry from the age of eighteen, as an Ironworker for ten years and started his own construction company at the age of 28 years.

He joined the Kaneohe Jaycees when he was 24 years old and became their President at the age of twenty seven. Later he joined the Honolulu Jaycees and was the 50th State Fair Chairperson in 1980, overseeing over 400 workers and committee persons. In 1988 he

joined the Kahaluu Lions Club and became President in three years. At the same time, Lion C.J. became a Board Member for the Kahaluu Key Project and later President. In 1999, Barbara Jean Grace became Barbara Jean (B.J.) Kalopodes. Lion C.J.'s family includes five adult children, nine grandchildren, and "two acquired greats".

After moving to Kaneohe in 2000, Lion C.J. joined the Kaneohe Lions and became President within three years. His wife B.J., joined the Lions after following him around and helping with projects for 13 years.

FVDG C.J. has received many awards and honors over the years including Lion of the Year, Secretary of the Year, achievement awards, and many certificates from the Lions and the community. He says, "My greatest award is the Melvin Jones Fellow award which I am very proud of. Lions have taught me a lot over the years and I am still learning. Being a District Governor will be the greatest highlight of my Lions career and to serve the Lion members of Hawaii and the world."





It was almost a year ago since the Lions and Principal Shannon Goo first discussed the possibility of replacing a worn-out,

outdated, unstable, and less than optimum work space. The question was how to bring

this improbable dream to reality especially with soaring material costs and supply chain issues -- the answer was a partnership. The PTSA provided the bulk of the funds. The Lions Club provided the balance of the funding, manpower, and finish-carpentry expertise thru its member Eric Kvick, owner of Quality Carpentry and Painting, LLC. New laminated flooring and installation was generously donated by In Line Flooring Inc. and its President, Hawaii Kai resident Taryn Miyamoto.

The office staff, along with a handful of parents, also stepped up by spending a day adding a fresh coat of paint to the

office space. Although this project ended up being more expensive and taking longer than first envisioned, the dramatic result spoke for itself.
