TRAVELING 100,000 MILES TO SERVE LIONS AROUND THE WORLD

appy New Year! Pam and I hope that you and your loved ones have had a very Merry Christmas, and that the joyous spirit of the holidays continues on through the new year. It's hard to believe that 2023 flew by so quickly, and that my term as International Director will be over in six months. It has been an honor and privilege to serve not only the Lions of Hawaii, but the 1.4 million Lions members who proudly serve, CHANGING THE WORLD!

Since the International Convention in Boston in July, Pam and I attended the USA/Canada Forum in Reno in September, and the October International Board meeting in Cairo, Egypt, and the service project in the Masai Mara, Kenya. International President Patti Hill chose these locations for her meeting and service project to highlight our newest Constitutional Area 8 – Africa. Our visit will spur membership growth and extension of new clubs and districts on the African continent.

Our service projects in Kenya covered Diabetes, the Environment, Hunger, Vision and Youth, five of our eight global causes. The

projects were meaningful and impacted the lives of thousands of people. Being halfway around the world, we were reminded of the true global nature, the ever-growing sphere, of our Association, and the impact we have around the world through our service and LCIF. We truly are "Changing the World"! Pam and I would like to thank the Lions of Egypt and Kenya, especially their Host Committees, for their phenomenal hospitality and kindness while we were there.

Our first official visitation for this fiscal year was to MD35, in Orlando, Florida, at the beginning of November, and our next will be to MD5M-5 in Wilmar, Minnesota, later this month. District 5M-5 is the home district of Past President Brian and Lori Sheehan, so we will finally discover where Bird Island is.

For this year, our International Board meetings will be in Vancouver, Canada in March, and concludes at the International Board Meeting and Convention, in Melbourne, Australia in June. In between, Pam and I will once again cross the country over a dozen times, visiting Lions from Oregon to Maine, flying almost another 100,000 miles, just like last year.

In addition to the in-person Board meetings, there are numerous virtual LCI Committee and Area meetings to attend and deal with during the year. When home, Pam and I have been involved with the District and our club whenever our schedule permits. When the wildfires devastated Maui in August, we immediately contacted LCIF for emergency funding, and I networked with my fellow Lions around the world, to raise additional disaster relief funds and directed them to HLF. On August 11, Pam and I flew to Sacramento to connect with friends actively involved with the California Lions Foundation, who promised to help raise substantial donations for Hawaii. We also heard from our fellow Directors and other members of the International family, and from the Lions and Districts that we had met during our visitations, who offered help and support for the people of Hawaii, especially those affected in Lahaina.

To date, due to the efforts of all involved, HLF has received over \$500,000 from Lions and Districts all over the world, proving that the Lions Ohana truly exists. I want to thank all those, here and abroad, who were actively involved in the fundraising efforts. During the USA/Canada Forum in Reno, I was given time to thank the Lions assembled there, for their overwhelming support and contributions. 1st VDG Lori, 2nd VDG Sean and District LCIF coordinator, IPDG Gary, joined me on stage to express our mahalo.

In the District, I have submitted two proposed changes to the District's Constitution and By-

Laws Committee for consideration this year. First, as I reflect upon the donations received by HLF from Lions around the world, I believe it is time for us to consider and discuss a method for us to "pay it forward". We have received hundreds of thousands of dollars from other Lions Districts and Foundations to help us at our time of need. Unfortunately, we have no mechanism in place for our District to reciprocate in kind. I propose that the District establish a "Kokua" fund to help other Districts during their time of disaster.

Secondly, as Pam and I travel across the country, we encounter many Districts with a shortage of Vice District Governor (VDG) candidates running for office. One of the primary reasons given for this is cost, as the creation of the office of first and second VDG was an unfunded mandate from LCI, with expenditures for those offices being a personal expense.

I feel it is time that the District recognize this problem and help defray some of their costs. I have proposed an In-District budget of \$1,500.00 for each of our VDGs, to help cover some of the transportation, hotel and other associated costs for visitations and invitations

within our District. They would be reimbursed upon receipt of such expenditures in a timely manner. I look forward to discussion and your support on these two proposals.

While we are busy, we always look forward to being with you during in-district requests and events. Please feel free to contact and invite us, as we will be there if our schedule permits.

As the New Year dawns, Pam and I would like to thank you for being Lions, and for being part of our Lions Ohana. May you discover and relish, the joys of service along your Lion's journey, as much as I have through the years. May 2024 be a joyous and prosperous one for you and yours.

Australia 2024 International Convention

What You Need To Know

—The following information was obtained from the <u>lionsclubs.org</u> website—

Passport requirements

You are required to have a valid passport to enter Australia. It is recommended, but not required, that your passport be valid for at least six months from the time of entry.

Visa requirements

There are different types of Australian visas available depending on the length of your stay, your passport and the purpose of your visit.

Use the visa finder tool

https://immi.homeaffairs.gov.au/visas/getting-a-visa/visa-finder to determine which visa best fits your needs.

You'll also need to:

Meet certain financial and medical requirements

Be outside of Australia when applying Maintain health insurance for the duration of your stay

The visa that most should apply for is the Tourist ETA Visa (Subclass 601). It costs \$20.00AUD or roughly \$13.60USD.



One way to obtain the Tourist ETA visa is to apply online through the AustralianETA mobile

app. A screenshot of the app store page is shown to the right, please make sure you download the correct app.

Follow the prompts until you reach the end, the application process took me less than 10 minutes to complete. The visa was approved within another 10 minutes.

Hawaii Lions Foundation (HLF) Grant Success Story

nother Hawaii Lions Foundation grant-inaid allowed Waiakea Lions Club to provide humanitarian assistance for the mother of a former Waiakea High School Leo. The recipient is wheelchair bound and struggled transferring between vehicle and her home because of the "rough loose gravel."





On November 5, 2023, three Lions Wayne Kuwaye, Collins Tomei, George Ribao, one Companion In Service and three friends expended 51 total hours to pour a 16 feet by 20 feet concrete pad. The smooth concrete surface is so much easier now to use the wheelchair to get in and out of the vehicle.





The total project cost \$2,907.87. HLF grant-inaid provided \$1,474.89 and the balance of \$1,432.98 was provided by in kind services and donation of materials.

Project chair Lion Wayne Kuwaye reported that Region VII HLF Trustee Lion Greg Ayau helped him prepare and present the grant-in-aid application to the HLF Board of Trustees. Lion Wayne provided the details to HLF and remarked "it was worth the effort."

The Hawaii Lions Foundation Grant-In-Aid program provides financial support beyond the means of Lions Clubs of District 50 to better deal with sight, hearing and other humanitarian efforts within their communities. 

Maui Wildfire Disaster: A Story About The Lahaina Shingon Mission

Rev. Hogan Yujiri immigrated to Lahaina from Japan in 1902. This was the beginning of the Lahaina Shingon Mission, the oldest Shingon temple in Hawaii. Rev. Takayuki Meguro, our Sensei, shared his experience after visiting the site of our temple which was burned down and seeing his family home burned down also.





our months have passed since the fire. I recently re-entered the place where our temple was and would like to share with you my thoughts and feelings at that time.

To begin with, I had no idea that it would take me four months to visit the site where our temple and the house where my family and I lived. It doesn't seem like much time has passed since the fire, I was thinking if this was Japan it would be winter, but here there is very little difference between the seasons. What do you think would happen if there is a place like Japan where there is a large seasonal change? August 8th would have been a very hot day in the middle of summer, just like Hawaii. In December, snow would begin to fall, and people would shrug off the cold by putting on their warm coats. I think summer feels like a distant memory to me already. It really took a long time for this day to come. That day I entered via the highway from the Puamana side, south of Lahaina. As I drove

down the highway, I gradually felt like I was entering a different world. Even I felt fear as I entered Prison Street. At this point I needed some time to understand where I was. A world without any landmarks was terrifying to me. Of course, I remember the streets, how could I forget, I lived in this town for 20 years. But I couldn't find the road very well. The big tree I had used as a landmark was gone. It was supposed to be the end of the road, but I could see all the way to the ocean beyond it. It was only a few minutes away to the temple, but it was a long and terrifying journey for me.

Right after arriving at the temple site, I performed a service with Watanabe Sensei and Kitagawa Sensei while wearing protective clothing. I thought a lot of emotions would come over me, sadness, anger, frustration. But the most important thing to me to do was to apologize to ODAISHISAMA for making him wait for four months before I was able to visit the site. However, when we began the service,

my mind was strangely at ease. It was like a calm ocean, like a mirror. I felt a warmth as if the sun was rising from beyond that ocean. I felt that the Buddha was talking to me. "Are you okay? It is a very difficult time for you. You can do it, go for it". I don't have any special abilities, but that's how I felt.

My feelings have changed from terrified to hopeful and full of happiness in those few hours. I also felt my path which I must go was clear. I believe that there is huge difference between having a landmark or milestone and not having one at all in our lives. It doesn't matter how big or small, we need a place where everyone can gather and pray to ODAISHISAMA's guidance in this difficult time.

It has been more than 30 years since I began my Buddhist practice, and this is one of the major revelations that ODAISHISAMA has given me. Nothing will change our difficult situation, but it was a very thankful experience for me.

When we are in a dark place, we can find the light very easily. Even if that light is very tiny. Each light we find may be small, but if we pick it up, we obtain great strength.

Four months was a long time, but I had a very important experience. Although there is nothing left to burn, I feel I gained something significant.

Multiple carts with prizes were needed to get to the winners. Everyone was a winner.



When not engaged in Lion service, Director Paradiso enjoys traveling, art appreciation and sharing good food and wine with friends.


